

Imagine, if you will...five "mature males" in an SUV traveling at Turnpike speeds for hours (to and from the Oklahoma Train Show)...and the varied topics of conversation. And after the laughter subsided a very informative discussion took place on the topic of ways to foreshorten structures without destroying them. To further add to this story, two of the five were retired "shop-teacher-types". (hopefully, you are chuckling by this point of the story)

Two options came out: 1) using a band saw with a VERY fine toothed blade and running at a slow speed & 2) was the use of a "Japanese Backsaw" Interestingly enough, both retired teachers concurred on both options, but both agreed using the backsaw was probably the best option.

What is a 'Japanese Backsaw' you ask? (pictured below)





One side is "coarse" and the other is "fine" toothed. Unlike most saws, this cuts on the "pull-stroke"







SHORT STORY #1 — In 1992, I made a fast trip to the Los Angeles, CA area, for two train shows being held during the same weekend. After the second show, I left Los Angeles for Newton, Kansas. We departed "on-time" heading for Pasadena, CA. About 10-15 minutes out of Los Angeles, we came to a stop. We sat there for a while. Finally, an ambulance comes with red light flashing. The ambulance crew came with a backboard. As they carried the pedestrian that the locomotive had hit, I realized what had happened. If I had opened the window, (a definite NO-NO on Amtrak) I could have looked out and down and seen the entire scene. The victim was carried back to the ambulance stretcher and placed into the ambulance. 20 - 30 people were standing there watching the show. Once the stretcher was placed into the ambulance, the crowd kept looking through their windows. The ambulance left, red lights flashing. After all the reports were filled out, we left for Pasadena. As we pulled into Pasadena, an announcement was made that we would be delayed 45 minutes to an hour until the locomotive crew could be changed. We eventually left and wound up arriving in Newton, about two hours late.

SHORT STORY #2 - My wife and I were going to Charlotte, NC to take care of 3-5 year olds at a church conference. We were lat leaving Newton, KS but arrived in Kansas City early. We left Kansas City on time. We got out into open country and stopped. After sitting there awhile, we were told that the locomotive crew was out of hours and needed to be replaced. They told us we'd be on our way just as soon as a new crew arrived. Finally, about an hour or so we started rolling. We got to Chicago, thinking we had missed our connection to Washington D.C. I was looking for the place to change our tickets, when my wife said the train to Washington hadn't left yet. So we headed into the waiting area. Shortly after we sat down, here comes a large gentleman who just found out he missed the train to California. At that point he was not the happiest of campers. As time went on, he became more upset. Station personnel tried to calm him down. They told him to calm down or they would have to call Security. He continued to be upset. I saw a station attendant on a phone. I told my wife: "Watch them send someone smaller than him to handle this." Sure enough, here comes a lady about 50 or so. She was about half his size. When she said "Can I do something to help?" My wife and I were bitting the skin of our lips to keep from busting out laughing. But then came three Security officers and took things over, even threatening to take him to lock-up facilities. They all went outside, and we never heard any more. We continued our trip to Washington D.C. to visit our niece and her family. I had taken a Lionel train set along that I had rescued from a trash pile for her 2 boys. It was a hit. They still have the set.















TECHNOLOGY ON THE RAILS (SHARED BY PHIL AYLWARD)

Railroads finding hidden freight car trackers By Justin Franz | September 24, 2015 | TRAINS

What's in a picture? In this one a brown-painted automatic equipment identification, or AEI, reader barely pokes out of a slope along a Conrail right-of-way in New Jersey. Railroads are alarmed that the AEI readers might be spread throughout the country, gathering and sharing information on freight moves without their knowledge.

METUCHEN, N.J. – Railroads are uncovering hidden freight car tracking devices near rights-of-way around the country.

The discoveries began earlier this month when a Metuchen, N.J., resident found two people installing boxes near a Conrail Shared Assets Operation right-of-way. Unsatisfied with those persons' answers and

the local police response, the person called Norfolk Southern railroad police who investigated and found an automatic equipment identification or AEI reader, used to track freight cars by monitoring their built-in radio beacons.

On Sept. 15, the Association of American Railroads' Railway Alert Network issued a security warning to members to keep an eye out for the unauthorized devices. <u>Trains</u> NewsWire obtained a copy of the security alert earlier this week.

According to the eight-page report, railroad police investigated further and found that a company called ClipperData had installed the reader. ClipperData was formed about two years ago and sells comprehensive data regarding the energy industry, including the movement of crude oil and other commodities. According to the report, Norfolk Southern police say they have a copy of a "lease agreement" between a homeowner near the right-of-way and ClipperData which gave the homeowner \$500 to use a nearby electrical outlet to power the equipment reader.

In an interview with <u>Trains</u> News Wire on Wednesday, ClipperData CEO Sterling

Lapinski confirmed that his company installed the first AEI reader discovered in New Jersey. He says his company's work is legal and that ClipperData is currently looking at trying to sell data to

and about the railroad industry, which is why it installed the AEI reader. Lapinski says his company sells data and information to government agencies, trading groups, and energy companies.

"We do have devices installed but the network isn't operational yet," Lapinski tells <u>Trains</u> News Wire. "We're not currently selling data, we're just trying to see if it's feasible."

Railroads around the world use similar equipment reader technology that uses radio waves to automatically identify freight cars at speed. Railroads typically gather the information to update their own records before sharing it with other shippers, such as trucking companies, railroads, or steamship lines, and customers.

Sources close to Class I railroad corporate offices say executives are upset and are ready to take a "scorched earth" approach to dealing with ClipperData and other companies that may have installed readers throughout the country. A second security alert dated Sept. 22, says railroaders have uncovered at least one other equipment reader in New Jersey and one in Sheridan, Wyo. The one in Wyoming reportedly interfered with BNSF Railway track equipment.

The Railway Alert Network report raised concerns that the people who installed the equipment readers trespassed on railroad property to do so. It also raises concerns about selling data on the movement of specific types of rail cars, arguing that the information could be used to "disrupt rail operations through intentional, and potentially destructive, acts." The security alert asks railroads that find similar AEI readers to inform the alert network immediately so that it can consolidate all of the reports.

In a statement to <u>Trains</u> NewsWire, AAR spokesperson Ed Greenberg says the organization is keeping a close eye on the developing situation. "The AAR was aware of this situation and pleased that local law enforcement and railroad police took steps to address the situation as quickly as possibly," Greenberg says.

Norfolk Southern declined to comment on this topic. <u>Trains</u> is waiting for a response from BNSF.

son, 54, a 33-year Rock Island employee, has begun a business in the El Reno yard reparing rail cars. He said the funereal daily trip to the little-used yard is sobering. "To come here the first thing in the morning

it was very depressing," he said.



"The shop is just completely empty. All the employees are gone, except for a few railroad detectives."

El Reno was/is still very much a "Rock Island" town at heart.
